
RHU tailor shop in place

Archbishop Janan Luwum's day





On the 16th of this month, one of Uganda's archbishops is celebrated as a martyr in the Anglican Church. After being invited to attend a rally with the former president of Uganda, HE Idi Amin Dada, Janan Luwum was kidnapped along with two other ministers. He was the archbishop of the church of Uganda from 1974 to 1977 and during his reign, he always stood for the truth despite the dictatorial rule of the president Amin. His death aroused a lot of questions and so many allegations also came up. Some say that he was murdered and buried in a mass grave; others say that his body was found riddled with bullets before being given to his family. He left a widow and nine children. Our current president led the celebrations to commemorate his death and also present was a former soldier of Amin who was ordered to bury him and during his speech; the soldier narrated his ordeal before thousands of people in the crowd. He is a recognized martyr in London at the Westminster Abbey and on the 17th of February, he is also celebrated in the lesser festival.

Education at a high cost

In Uganda today, the rising cost of education is forcing more and more children to drop out of school.
